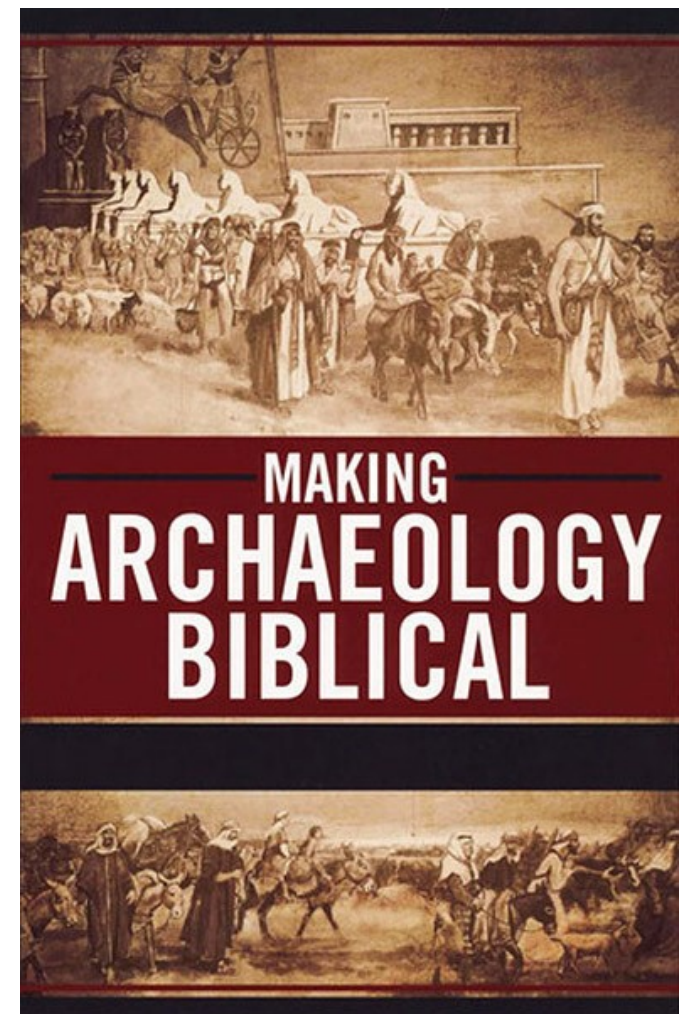


Conquest. **Chart 4 (p. 93 and 205)**—Comparison of Old Testament and Egyptian chronologies (revised dating) during the XIIth Dynasty. **Chart 5 (p. 94 and 206)**—Comparisons of Old Testament and Egyptian Synchronisms during Dynasty XII. **Chart 6 (p. 95 and 207)**—The chronology of the XIIth Dynasty, compared with the reigns of Saul to Asa. **Basic Chronological Data — Chart 7 (p. 51 and 208)**—List of the 18 standard “Archaeological Ages,” along with corresponding modernist (not moderate or revised) dating and modernist dynastic arrangement. **Chart 8 (p. 90 and 209)**—Modernist list of Egyptian kings, in relation to both modernist and moderate approximate dates of the Exodus. The top date is the modernist date for the late XIIIth Dynasty and the Hyksos era. The central date (by Thutmose III) represents the moderate placement. The bottom date (by Rameses II) is the modernist approximate date span for the Exodus. **Chart 9 (p. 91 and 210)**—Correlation (revised arrangement) of the various dynasty overlaps of the first five dynasties. eclipse-fixed Assyrian chronology. **HOW THIS BOOK CAME ABOUT** Since the mid-1980s, the present writer has tried to penetrate the maze of sceptical conjectures and reports which have enshrouded modern archaeological research. **Although much has been found by archaeologists ever since the 1930s, little of it seems to connect with Scripture.** By its nature, archaeological discoveries primarily consist of a variety of stonework and objects dug out of layers of dirt. Coupling these with ancient historical records can be a daunting task. Yet, surely the artifacts which are uncovered ought to verify Biblical events, instead of apparently disproving them. In 1989, I came across an article in a mid-1970’s creationist journal, which mentioned in passing an attempt by someone named Donovan Courville, who tried to unravel the mystery of why, instead of providing new confirmations of the Bible, current archaeology was only producing additional evidence which appeared to deny its validity. By the late 1990s, I had tackled the problem somewhat; but there were missing links which needed filling in. Then, early in 2007, I was finally able to obtain a copy of Courville’s major work, *The Exodus Problem and Its Ramifications*. Upon opening its pages, I was disappointed to find that it had been prepared in a complicated writing style. In the late 1940s, Courville had initially learned about the modernist takeover of professional archaeology, which occurred a little after the turn of the 20th Century. A general overview of the area. **Map 5 (p. 200)**—Palestine-1. A simplified map of the primary cities in ancient Palestine. **Map 6 (p.201)**—Palestine-2. A more complete map of cities in ancient Palestine. **PICTURES** **Picture 1 (p. 26)**—The Horpasen Genealogical Inscription. This

picture provides you with a sample of Egyptian hieroglyphic writing. **Picture 2 (p. 39)**—The Palermo Stone. This is one of Egypt's monuments which includes chronological data. **Picture 3 (p. 103)**—The Step Pyramid of King Zoser. This was the first pyramid constructed in ancient Egypt; it was patterned after the Ziggurats in Mesopotamia and the Tower of Babel which preceded them. **Picture 4 (p. 109)**—People entering Egypt from Palestine at the approximate time when Abraham journeyed there. Lighter skinned, they show their type of clothing, etc. **Picture 5 (p. 116)**—Section of an inscription from Ur, dated earlier than the Hyksos, showing the use of a chariot. **Picture 6 (p. 139)**—Mummy heads of three of the most important pharaohs of ancient time, showing what they looked like. **Picture 7 (p. 174)**—Hammurabi's name. This picture helps you see what Assyrian and Babylonian cuneiform (wedge-shaped) writing looks like. **CHRONOLOGY AND TIME LINE CHARTS** **Charts 1 to 5** will be very helpful to every reader, for they provide chronological data in relation to people named in the Bible. **Charts 6 to 8** provide basic chronological data underlying this entire revised dating system. **Charts 9 to 20** consist of king lists and chronologies. Most readers will find these of little interest. Because of their importance, **Charts 1-9** are also included in the text of the book, at the approximate locations where they are most needed. Notice that **Charts 4, 6, and 13– 17** concern the very important **Dynasties XII and/or XIII**. In the introductory list, below, the most important charts are underlined. **Old Testament Chronologies - Chart 1 (p. 32 and 202)**—The entire time period (Biblical) from the beginning of the Exodus, on down through the Conquest, and time of the Judges, to 3 years into the reign of Solomon, plus Bible references. **Chart 2 (p. 33 and 203)**—A simplified chronology (revised dating) of the 480-year period of 1 Kings 6:1, indicating various overlappings. **Chart 3 (p. 92 and 204)**—Location of the basic Egyptian dynasties (revised dating), in relation to the approximate revised dating of Biblical events from Joseph's famine to the fall of Israel. Early Bronze coincides with the
